	Fulcher: President Biden's Pardon Proclamation	a. " will pardon all prior federal offenses of simple marijuana possession"

		b. The White House did acknowledge that no one is currently in prison for	
		"simple possession" of marijuana. But believes the pardon will help those with	
		convictions to have better access to housing and employment.	
		2) The President's Pardon has limited reach – only applies to federal offenses	
		a. Most marijuana possession charges are State offenses.	
		b. Per FBI data – Idaho has some of the highest arrest numbers for Marijuana	
		possession in the nation (232 reported arrests per 100,000 in 2021).

		3) The President's Proclamation does not apply to Idaho possession convictions.	
		a. However, the President did "urge" governors to follow his lead.	
		b. The Administration could try to push states into compliance through	
		additional strings on federal funding, etc.	
		i. Something the Congressman's office is watching closely.	
		4) The President's proclamation is mainly political.

		d.	Current Congressional Leadership has already pursued such effort.
			 i. H.R. 3617: Marijuana Opportunity Reinvestment and Expungement Act (MORE)
			Would decriminalize marijuana.
			2. Passed the House on April 1st, 2022.
			 H.R. 1996: Secure and Fair Enforcement Banking Act of 2021 (Safe Banking Act of 2021)
			1. Would allow federally regulated banking institutions to
			provide banking services to cannabis related businesses.
			2. Passed the House on April 19, 2021.
		e.	Congressman Fulcher opposed both bills. And is opposed to any efforts to
			decriminalize and/or legalize marijuana.
		5) Issues	along the Southern Border.
		a.	The Congressman is greatly concerned about the lack of enforcement.
		b.	Per HIDTA (High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area) drugs such as meth are no
			longer produced locally. They are now trafficked to Idaho from the southern border.
		C.	Recently, the Canyon County Sheriff's office confiscated 4000 fentanyl pills
			during a routine stop in Nampa. We're hopeful that Congress will have leadership in 2023 that will work to

This means that the angrier you get, the stronger they become. So, your best bet for ridding the internet of trolls is to starve them of a reaction. (3) Educate: Once you have had a cooling off period and you still want to respond, do so by
- sticking to facts leave emotion out of it. If you rise above the situation and communicate with poise, you can de-escalate a problem quickly. However, if the conversation becomes unproductive, it is important to cut it off. (4) Report: The Meridian Anti-Drug Coalition adheres to the City of Meridian social media policy.
